Leading Candidates for WTO Director-General Call for Reforms

It's the final countdown...to choose the next Director-General of the World Trade Organization.

Last week, the WTO announced two finalists, South Korean Minister of Trade Yoo Myung-hee and former Nigerian Finance Minister Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala. The Chamber's International Division recently hosted Yoo and Okonjo-Iweala for conversations with members, and we were pleased to hear both <u>call for reforms</u> – an issue the Chamber has long supported.

The process has also delivered a major milestone. Whichever candidate is announced in early November, a woman will hold the WTO's top job for the first time in the organization's 25-year history.
