- "Our economy is poised for a great resurgence, signaled by 6.4% growth in the first quarter. But this trajectory is not a foregone conclusion. The wrong policies from government could stop the U.S. economic recovery in its tracks."
- "America is open for business. We are eager to ink new trade deals and strengthen established alliances. And we are committed to the multilateral organizations that support global trade and public health."
- "The potential for people, communities, and economies to significantly boost growth through digital commerce is vast.... So we must fight back against restrictions on data flows, regulations that stifle innovation and investment, and policies that undermine intellectual property—all of which threaten the economic recovery."

• "Achieving our desired reductions in greenhouse gas emissions while also meeting the world's growing demand for power will require new technology—and the private sector will have to lead the way."
