Infrastructure Progress Continues in a Bipartisan Direction

Big picture: "Recent infrastructure proposals by Senator Capito, yesterday's plan by the Problem Solvers Caucus, and ongoing negotiations among the core group of bipartisan Senators prove there are paths that will lead to a bill that can be signed into law," said Neil Bradley, Chamber Executive Vice President and Chief Policy Officer, today.

What's new: "The current efforts of bipartisan Senators seeking consensus should be embraced – not shunned," the Chamber wrote in a <u>letter to Senators today</u>. "A partisan budget reconciliation process would delay action and create far more controversies and political division."

Why it matters: Durable policy that brings certainty for business owners and jobs creators comes through bipartisan efforts. That's why the Chamber has long advocated this approach.

Bottom line: There is more in common between Democrats and Republicans on the core elements of an infrastructure bill. Achieving success in rebuilding America's infrastructure requires both parties to come together.
